

AUTHOR'S BIOGRAPHY

Jacinta Halloran lives in Melbourne, where she works as a GP. She has written on medical science for The Sunday Age, and her short stories have been published in *New Australian Stories 2* and *The Pen and the Stethoscope*. Her first novel, *Dissection*, was published in 2008.

QUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- I. *Pilgrimage* is largely set in Romania. What is the effect of this setting on the events of the novel? Could this novel have equally been set in Australia?
- To what extent has Celeste shaken off the effects of her Catholic upbringing?
- 3. Celeste is sometimes weighed down by what she sees as the responsibilities of the eldest child. Do you think that birth order among siblings has a significant bearing on their roles within the family? What's your experience of this?
- 4. On p. 309, Patricia says to Celeste, "I sometimes wonder if you'd have fought with your father too, had he been alive when you were a teenager. Was it Lionel, do you think? Or was it you with your teenage moods?" What do you think?
- 5. What do you imagine might have happened to Patricia at Nicula? What do you wish would happen? Why do you think the book ends before Patricia reaches her destination?
- 6. Stefan calls himself a tour guide, but what other purpose does his character serve in the novel?
- 7. How, if at all, do your perceptions of Nathalie change during the course of the novel?
- 8. With which character or characters do your sympathies mainly lie, and why? Do your allegiances change during the novel?
- What does *Pilgrimage* say about family relationships? What do the relationships in the novel have in common with your own?
