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AUTHOR'S BIOGRAPHY

Born in rural Wisconsin, Amy Espeseth immigrated to Australia in the late 1990s and lives in Melbourne. A writer, publisher and academic, she is the recipient of the 2007 Felix Meyer Scholarship in Literature, the 2010 QUT Postgraduate Creative Writing Prize, and the 2012 CAL Scribe Fiction Prize. Sufficient Grace won the 2009 Victorian Premier's Literary Award for an unpublished manuscript.

OUESTIONS TO CONSIDER

- I. Is Ruth's relationship to the natural world a normal response to a childhood immersed in hunting and fishing, or is it something more?
- 2. Are there aspects of the family's religious experience that you admire or envy? What parts of their beliefs are most difficult to understand?
- 3. What makes an individual part of a family and culture? Is it blood, practice, like-mindedness, or obligation? Are family and culture choices individuals can make?
- 4. Although fraught, relationships within the family are strong. Are the friendships, love affairs, and kinships made stronger or weaker by the trials the family face?
- 5. Why is the family so wary of the secular world, including doctors? Do they have real reasons to fear people outside their faith?
- 6. Where could the girls have turned for help? What might have been a better way out of their situation? Why didn't they ask anyone for help?
- 7. What drives Ruth to make her choice in the barn? What would have happened if she hadn't? Does she protect or harm Naomi?
- 8. Why does Ingwald make his choice regarding Samuel? What would have happened if he hadn't? Who is he trying to protect?
- 9. Who is ultimately responsible—legally, ethically, spiritually— for the horrific events of the novel?
